

What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday, March 5, 2025

On Ash Wednesday, we are marked with the cross using ashes and the words from Genesis, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," reminding us that God loves us and forgives us.

Children can be very curious about the idea of adults wearing ashes in the shape of a cross on their foreheads. Children may wish to have their own ashes as a sign that "I am part of this, too". We are first marked with the cross using water (and sometimes oil) at our baptisms. At that time, to be marked with the cross is a wonderful thing as we are identified as the loved children of God.

At St. Luke Preschool, Pastor Brad will be dispensing ashes for interested parents, children, and staff from 8:45-9:10 am at the preschool main entrance. Whether or not you are Lutheran, whether or not you've had ashes on your forehead before, you are invited to request ashes, to ask questions, and to join the Lenten journey of self-reflection and faith, if you would like to.

Ash Wednesday services at St. Luke Lutheran Church will be observed on Wednesday, March 5, at 12:00 noon and 6:00 pm and are open to all who wish to attend.

Illness Policy

Thank you for your help with the health and wellness of the preschool community.

Together we make a difference!

- Send a Brightwheel message or an e-mail to <u>both</u> Lori and Jane <u>any</u> time your child will be absent, even if he/ she is not sick, as we are required to track absences.

 Be sure to let us know your child's symptoms.
- In order to return to the preschool following illness, children (and staff) must be:
 fever free (without medication), diarrhea free, and vomiting free for 24 hours, and able to
 participate in the school day successfully with respect to energy level and engagement.
 Children with excessive amounts of mucus and coughing should remain at home to help
 minimize illness at the preschool.

If your child becomes ill while at school, you will be called to pick him/ her up within 30 minutes of receiving the call. Please be sure to keep your local contact information updated with us. If we are unable to get ahold of a parent, we will continue calling down the list of emergency contacts until we reach someone.

Read Together to Support Early Literacy

Children who have lots of experiences with books absorb the rhythms and patterns of language and, at surprisingly early ages, begin to imitate the language and gestures their parents and caregivers use while sharing stories, sometimes turning pages and murmuring as they "read" the pictures.

While we can't expect infants and toddlers to learn to read and write yet, they are nevertheless developing skills that provide a foundation for later literacy. When you share books with your very young child you support emerging literacy as you:

- help your child learn that pictures and words are symbols that can be interpreted;
- expose your child to new words, thereby increasing her vocabulary; and
- familiarize your child with the conventions of print.

Understanding pictures and print as symbols

Within their first 18 months, most infants who have explored and shared books with adults show an understanding that pictures symbolize things in the real world, an understanding that is uniquely human (Barton & Brophy-Herb 2006). For example, at around 12 months, an infant seems to understand that the cup in a picture on the page represents a cup like the one she drinks from every day. She may tell you about the connection she is making by looking at the picture and pointing to a nearby cup. Another child, age 17 months, enjoying the book *Goodnight Moon* with his dad, may murmur, "Hush," when his dad turns to the page about a quiet old lady who was whispering, "Hush" (Schickedanz 1999). Understanding that pictures are symbols of real things is a first step toward understanding that print also represents ideas of items in the real world.

Children may begin to notice print in addition to pictures between 15 and 20 months, and by 32 months a child may move a finger or her whole hand across a line of print and verbalize her memory of what the text says (Schickedanz 1999). Although we might find constantly answering the question, "What say?" exhausting, children's recognition that pictures and print convey meaning is an important step in emerging literacy that we need to support by responding to their inquiries (Neuman, Copple, & Bredekamp 2000).

Increasing vocabulary

Sharing books will expand your very young child's growing vocabulary. Storybooks often use words in ways that are different from how we use those same words in everyday conversation. Books also use words that are generally absent from day-to-day speech. *The Napping House*, for example, contains many descriptive words related to napping, such as *slumbering*, *snoozing*, and *dozing*, which adults may rarely use in a conversation with a child. By hearing new words in the context of a story and having them explained by an adult, children's word comprehension will grow, and they will eventually incorporate new words into their spoken vocabularies.

Learning the conventions of print

Through early exposure to books, children begin to learn about the conventions of reading in their own language. For example, very young children using books in English learn that they are read from front to back, from the left of the page to the right, and from the top of the page to the bottom. Books in some other languages have different print conventions. Children learn that books have names (or "titles") and that they are written by "authors." Some older toddlers might be interested in books whose layouts break the rules; for example, books that are read from back to front, from right to left, or up and down the page in vertical columns.

The Albuquerque Northeast Lions Club. is giving a free vision screening test.

Your child is eligible to have a state of the art digital image taken for evaluation to determine if your child should be tested further by the eye specialist of your choice.

The photo screening and evaluation may determine the presence of eye disorders including far and near sightedness, astigmatism, strabismus, anisometropia, exotropica, esotropia and media opacities (i.e. cataracts). Correction of vision disorders at an early age may greatly improve a child's ability to learn.

NO PHYSICAL CONTACT IS MADE WITH YOUR CHILDS EYES AND EYE DROPS ARE NOT NECESSARY.

By signing this form you give permission for your child, to participate in this screening event. You also agree that you understand and consent to the following:

- I, the parent or legal guardian, understand that I am responsible for arranging for a full eye exam with an eye care professional if I am informed that such an exam would be beneficial for my child by the Digital Image evaluation. I also agree that I will provide the required follow up medical information if further evaluation is indicated.
- The information obtained from this vision screening is to be considered a preliminary procedure only and does not constitute a diagnosis of or absence of vision problems. It should be utilized only as a part of a comprehensive eye care program which includes regular optometric / ophthalmological exams.
- The Albuquerque Northeast Lions Club. may keep the names of children screened and the date in order to provide follow up or to avoid unnecessary duplicate screening and may use a separate entity NMLOKS for follow up process. Follow up contact may include information on financial resources available to assist in obtaining eye care.
